HGC hopes to set up a Public Domain software idea, this has worked on many other micro's and so it should work on the Oric. This will help the current situation of no new software appearing for the Oric, and any type of software will be considered, adventure, arcade, utility, and on disk or cassette, and in any language. 'FRELON'

Game: Frelon

The French based company Loriciciels (now taken over by Elite Systems LTD) have released many Oric classics, including Video Flipper, Stanley, Intertron and 3D Munch.

Frelon is a bit like Airwolf on the Spectrum, CBM, etc. You move about a land split into five screens instead of scrolling. Your mission is this, you are in need of certain supplies, which will soon arrive by truck. The truck must pass over a bridge to get to you but the bridge has been knocked out ! There are about 8 blocks scatters around that you must collect and place on the bridge to fix it. You can only carry one at a time, so the mission takes a while.

The game is made difficult by the enemy forces, which come in the forms of tanks that shoot up at you and planes that try to crash into you. There are also some annoying bubbles that move slowly down the screen, fatal if touched. One of screens no. 4 or 5 has rockets that fly up the screen at you. Screen 5 is quite difficult, the block to be collected is down a hole. There is a lazer-beam that randomly fires across the exit so it must be timed carefully. To take this worse, there is a tank down the hole so it's wise to bomb the tank before going down the hole.

Screen three - the starting screen - has got a fuel pad. You have a fuel tanks that empties quite quickly so it's not a bad idea to refill when it's only half empty.

If you re-enter a screen the enemies that you killed will have returned. The keyboard control is excellent so a joystick is not a real advantage. The graphics are of very high quality with good use of colour. Loriciciels have eliminated ALL colour clash problems somehow, and added a high-score table. The sound effects of your movement is great. You are flying a chopper that turns and twists easily. If you complete the repairing of the bridge you get the satisfaction of seeing the truck drive over it, with a nice chugging of the engine.

You have three lives that are needed desperatly, although I admit to cheating with an 'infinite lives' poke that has already been printed in OUM. (If you didn't see it then ask for it). The game doesn't feature a volume setting (permanently set on high) but does feature a difficulty level.

Frelon is another great French game from Loriciciels and is highly addictive.

Game: 'Them'
 Supplier: Virgin Games

I loaded Them with a feeling of dread, not quite knowing what to expect. I had hated Virgin software ever since I played Killer Caverns, that left me gibbering and having nightmares about awful games for weeks to come. When Them loaded I found myself controlling a round circle with a smiling face on it ! This solves character animation, no moving legs, body, etc. I found that there was five stages to the game, you could choose difficulty so I opted for the easily played level, which was hard ! Stage one was one in which I had to move my smiling face around a maze seen from above, collecting an object which would then show me another object to collect, until I'd collected a set ammount. To stop me doing this were various baddies that came in varies shapes and sizes. I also had to avoid the walls ! Another stage had me rescueing explorers, changing bones to fit each other by matching parts of bones. This was hard to do but quite good fun. One stage (I think it was part 4) was excellent fun. I was being dragged along a machine belt into a killer machine that would turn me into a hamburger which didn't appeal to me. The belt dragged me further and further in each time a monster went off theedge of the screen. They came from above and below me and so I had to blast me before they all killed me ! Them has renewed my hope in Virgin software but not sent it soaring. The graphics are quite good (it shows you the authors face, with stunning detail) and detailed. The sound effects are fairly good too. It is not bad for the price.

Lords Of Time is quite simply a brilliant adventure that shows what a text adventure on the Oric can really be like. You start off with nothing in an ordinary house and very soon you find yourself in a fantasy land to do with time, clocks, etc. The lack of graphics is a little disapointing as most other computer versions have graphics, but who cares? The atmosphere is still very realistic. The vocabulary is near perfect, accepting many words you'd not normally be able to use. Lords Of Time has a save/load feature too, which is vital as it is not going to be solved quickly. It is well worth the asking price and no adventurer should be without this. One gripe, Oric Atmos owners can't use this without the Oric V1.0 BASIC ROM which is available for £ 22.95.

Part 2: By R.Cook

Here's the second part of our ever-so-popular series in which we show you just how many of the old arcade machines were ever converted for the Oric, and tell you if they're still around today.

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One of the most famous and playable was of course Asteroids. Unfortunately it never really made it to the Oric, except one small version by Artic, called (wait for it) Asteroids. This version only runs on the Oric 1, and is almost impossible to buy a new copy now. The Software Club hired this program out.

Centipede was released across nearly all computer formats, and having seen quite a few of them I have to say that the Oric is at least as good as the others, if not better. There is only one version of it, by PSS under the original name. HGC sells this game for just £ 1.99, a bargain.

Donkey Kong is almost as famous as Pac-Man and Space Invaders, and is very enjoyable, if only Oric owners could get to play much of it. It was only a while ago that the mail-order companies started to supply Dinky Kong, which isn't bad. There is an Atmos version but it isn't easy to find at all. There is also ORIC KONG and Donkey Kong, both by Hebdogiciel. I can't give judgement on either version as I've never even seen them !

One version I have seen is Singerie, or Monkey. It is a brilliant version with superb large graphics and great sound effects. It has to be the best version I've seen.

Even with those versions, hardly any are available outside France, so I can't see that British Oric owners get much fun out of Donkey Kong.

Missile Command was a game in which you had to stop towns being destroyed by many missiles. It was never really released as a full game for the Oric, but it is in the final part of a game called Delta 4 by the same author as 'Them', reviewed this issue. Missile Command is good.

Snooker NEVER was converted for the Oric. Trickshot by IJK isn't snooker, it's sort of a one player version of pool, and isn't too bad. There was a game called Billiards a while ago, but hardly anyone heard about it.

Fruit machines are good fun on computers because they don't gobble up your cash. Multigames 1 by Tansoft has a game called Bandit in it, which is fun but pays out too much.

Express Software (yes, the awful company) made a pathetic version called Bandit too. It sold for £ 1.99 but was just not worth it, it has to be the worst fruit machine simulator I've ever seen.

There was a version called Las Vegas which I've heard was quite good.

Finally this month, and ending Oldies Pursuit, Pinball Machines. Loricieis released Video Flipper and this was very good. Macadam Bumper by Ere Informatique was excellent, allowing you to design your own machine. Both were reviewed in OUM issue 3.

Cobra Pinball by Cobrasoft is also brilliant. It is a little hard to obtain in Britain but WE. Software say they hope to have it 'soon'. Pinball machines have converted excellently to the Oric, if you can get a copy.

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That's it from 'Oldies Pursuit', although we hoped to make it into a three month feature. There wasn't enough material, but we still gave you a decent feature. If you have any ideas for other features let us know.

This month we start a new series in OUM, in which you get to read about all our knowledge of a certain company who have released Oric software. This month Loriciels gets the slot, so read on.

Loriciels is a French based company who have only recently made alot of success in Britain, but not with Oric software, mainly with the Atari ST. They stopped releasing Oric software only when Elite Systems LTD took over them, who have never really had an interest in minority machines. Loriciels have released all sorts of software and it is hoped that soon some of this software will be easily available in the UK, if WE. Software continue with their plans.

They have released Aigle D'or, which is a classic adventure. Budget Familial is a high quality utility and Carn 3 is a fast shoot-em-up, so you see that they cater for all tastes.

Caspak, Sail Challenge, Citadel, Course Aux Lettres, Crocky, Diamant De L'ile Maudite, Doggy, Musical editor, Formule 1, Frelon, Gastronom, Gengraph, Godilloric, Hubert, Intertron, Jackman, Loritel, Lotoriciel, Manoir Du Dr Genius, Return of Dr Genius, Secret Tomb, Vortex, Video Flipper, Logo V1, Lorigraph, Mentor, Mystery De Kikenkendi, Orion, Protector, Reversi, Sorvivor, Star, Stanley, Super Jeep, 3D Munch, 3D Fungus, Vision, and a few more since our list was compiled.

Book Review

Book: The Oric Programmer
Supplier: Granada Publishing

BOOK

This book or more or less a better version of the Oric 1 BASIC manual, wrote by the two authors who've wrote so many other useful Oric books available by request from any library and many bookshops. More in the range are :

'The Oric 1 and how to make the most of it', 'The Oric 1 book of games', and 'The Oric Machine-Code handbook'. On with the review.

TOP has ten chapters slowly bringing you into better BASIC. It describes loops, strings, variables, graphics & sound, arrays, characters, HIRES, LORES, and if you don't know what they mean then you'd better get a copy yourself! It doesn't tell you about machine code though, it briefly mentions CALL, PEEK, POKE, etc. but doesn't dedicate much space to them.

The book also tells you about the Oric 1 V1.0 BASIC errors in ROM. It has a handy section on text and numbers that lets you know how to calculate easily on your Oric.

It also features two games in it, neither is exactly brilliant but fairly enjoyable and not too long to type in, they are: 'Word Game' that is a decent version of Hangman, and 'Attack The Saucer', which is a basic and easy version of Space Invaders.

The book is easy to understand and good value-for-money. It isn't really for the advanced programmer (they should get 'The Advanced User Guide') but it is perfect for somebody who wants to learn BASIC and has found, like everyone else that the manuals think you are a brilliant programmer. If you want to expand your knowledge of BASIC but are not ready for machine code then get this book.

Comment: Both A.T.M. and Xenon 1 drop out of the top ten, leaving I.J.K. with just two left, slowing dropping in quantity. Xenon 3 just holds out for yet another month at number 1 but the excellent Defence Force almost took it, Defence Force has only ever had one month at number 1. Starter 3D takes a tumble too, dropping four places to number 9, nearly out of the top ten. Frelon has a nice rise, slowly moving up, now in the top five, maybe next month it could make it to no. 3. There are two new entries this month, both sold by H.G.C.(Mailorder) which is most of the reason for the rise. They are Bozy Boa, by CDS Systems & Oric-Trek, by Salammander. Light Cycle and Hopper both came close to being new-entries too. Maybe there will be more of them next month.
