As I said last month there will be two shows for the Oric, although one is a show for minority micros in which Oric will have a section, see the news for more details. If these shows go down well then things could look up, as new software is already on it's way, with thanks to Allan Whitaker for his work. Even if new software did appear, it would take alot more to get it up and going again. For a start, there MUST be more Oric micros sold. Even though the Telestrat did sell a few micros, most of these were to people who already owned Orics, not new owners looking for new software. At these Oric shows? there will be alot of interest for Oric owners, but hopefully computers could be sold. OPELCO are selling Atmos's (see the news section) but there should be others. Oric had a good comeback a while ago, and I'm sure that most Oric owners were excited about the new Telestrat, and the mass of new software that appeared, eg. Maze Rally, Snake Venom, A View To A Kill, etc. All these would have sold better if there were more owners, and more people willing to sell it. Then the distributers started to stop selling Oricesoftware, such as FGC, OJ Software and Phildata. And now WE. Software are having alot of trouble selling Oric software, as HGC is selling it next to nothing. There is a new mailorder company who is thinking about selling Oric products called Capri Marketing who has let me know that they haven't made the final decission yet, if they do decide to give Oric the go ahead then you'll know as soon as it happens. I've strayed off the main point a little but next year could give Oric a much needed boost of new software and owners. with Atmos's declining in price. Of course the main problem with selling Atmos's is that no-one makes them anymore, Eureka fell through which was a large company, but with no decent business sense. Let's just see how these Oric shows go and hopefully a few more people will start to sell software for

Back to the present time, I want contributions! Tips, pokes, letters, programs, anything interesting will do! OUM can't keep 7 pages filled a month with nothing in it, so next month I want more. There are some tips this month but hardly anything from you, do something about it.

Now, here come the loads of other items (could someone give me another page ?) Allan Whitaker has got the rights to a new software title; It's a British version of a French title, it is called 'The Last Warriort. Expect to see it

out soon.

Compumart are selling 3" disk cheaners for £ 9,95. They work quick and very well, but £ 9.95 is a fair bit too expensive, they're usually out for about £ 6. Still, you might like to clean your disk-drive.

OPELCO are selling Atmos's for £ 40.00, not bad. Whether or not that includes P&P, Beads, Power pack, etc. I don't know. They also sell disk drives. Ask for

full details.

Mick Poat has built several interfaces for the Oric 1/Atmos. One is a drum machine that allows around 7 tracks to be played at one time (which could create some fantastic sounds), usuable from BASIC or machine-code. Mick Poat has also put together a nifty little prototype interface that will allow Oric 1 owners to load the ATMOS ROM from cassette, and then switch between

the Oric 1 and Atmos ROM's at will.

Many Tandy stores are now selling MCP40 (the Oric printer) paper and pens. If your local store isn't stocking them, ask them to get supplies in, all

major stores will have them soon.

Toby Simpson has designed and built a BBC Micro userport which plugs directly into the Oric's printer port. It will give the user the use of tracker balls, mice and joysticks, and all are useable in BASIC ! It also has a Ram-disc facility and all together about 20 devises can be plugged into the interface, not a bad collection for a micro with previously little assesories. Mr Kersey-Smith is to run an ORIC SPECIAL INTEREST GROUP on Toby Simpsons new bullitin board, from late September, so it should be up and running now ! If you have anything that could be included in it, write to his address above. I knew it, I've run out of space. I'll just add that WE.Software have had a massive reduction in Oric software sales, let's hope the shows bring more

Game: Skramble

Supplier: Microdeal

Price: £ 6.95

This is one of the few Microdeal games that were eventually converted to the Oric, including Space Shuttle & Arena 3000. It is one of quite affew skramble-type games for the Oric, my personal favourite being Lone Raider. In Skramble (also 16K compatible) you must play it as a normal scramble game, flying over mountains, past rocket silo's, and though caves. You must shoot UFO's as they fire fireballs at you, you must also bomb fuel dumps to increase your fuel supply that drops quite quickly. There is also ammunition dumps to help you too.

Skramble plays well, and is written in 100% machine-code so it's fast. often a bit too fast. The graphics are large and the screen seems a bit too-filled. The sound effects are good, much the same as other Microdeal games.

It is a decent version of scramble but nothing special, although it is fun.

Game: Battle Flight

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Price: £ 6.95 (not available easily in the UK, but 'The Software Club' hires out copies for £ 1.30 each).

Battle Flight is the first of Stours Oric games that I've seen, and isn't much of a good start. You take the role of a lone pilot, who much rid the skies of evel bandits. You start off by taking off from the runway, trying to keep your speed and height up, once mastered I found the take off easy, although my first few attempts left alot of scrap metal. Once in the air you must find out what height the bandits are at, by now your screen display is not like a normal flight simulator, more like Flight. although the game isn't as bad as Flight (what is ?). Once you fly off the screen you are on another part of a large map, each screen is pretty boring though, and it takes about five or six minutes to get off the screen. If you get behind a bandit plane then your screen display turns into a proper flight simulator where you'll see the enemy insight. Pound him with bullets and you'll run out of ammo on the next plane, you must spare your bullets by taking careful aim. This takes a very long time and out of at least twenty attempts I only ever got to this final screen once, and even then my ammo run out before I got him, then my fuel run out, then I added to the pile of scrapped planes again.

Battle Flight is a brave attempt at a game that hasn't been converted well to the Oric micro, and is another poor failiure. The game is slow, graphics are small and boring. The sound effects sound like a lawnmower, but there

isn't much noises that a plane can do, unless it gets shot down. The game isn't joystick controlled, the keyboard is your only means of play, which is fairly normal for the Oric, but at least most games have decent keyboard controls. The keys are set in awkward places so that you think that

it'd be easier to fly a real plane. Miss this mone.

IJK is without doubt the most popular software house for Oric owners in Britishhowners opinions, further proved in last months questions polled by OUM readers. There most famous games were the Xenon range, and the best selling game was Zorgons Revenge, still brilliant years on.

IJK went out of business about a year ago. They had released titles in France to try to halt declining sales but the French market was self-contained. IJK then tryed to get hold of French software but they didn't get any results. They had four great titles ready to be released but none of these looked ready to reach the mailorder houses. In an attempt to save itself IJK released other titles on other micros, mainly the BBC micro/Electron, but IJK was unheard of outside Oric, which caused bankruptcy.

Titles released include: Draughts, Invaders, Don't press the letter 'Q', Zebbie, Dambusters, Attack Of The Cybermen, Trickshot, Superfruit, Xenon 1, Zorgons Revenge, Frigate Commander, Gubbie, Playground 21, Pole Position, Agrenon, Ghost Gobbler, Damsel In Distress, Xenon 3, 3D Maze & Breakout, Green X Toad, Backgammon, Chess, Chess 3, Fantast Quest, Cribbage, Flight 401, Germain-Anglais, Moria, 3D noughts & crosses, Probe 3, 3D OXO/Backgammon, and a couple others easily forgotton and one or two hardly ever seen.

This is yet another game from Channal 8's range of 'Mysterious Adventures.'
Unlike most other micro's versions, the Oric version has some graphics, which
are drawn fast and are quite good.

The game has some interesting puzzles but an experienced adventurer shouldn't find them too hard. The screen layout is neat and the input response is quick. The only thing that I disliked about Golden Baton is the show key response. All the games in this range have this problems, it suffers because the input is printed on the HIRES screen which makes the printing slow. At one time I tried to type GO NORTH and ended up with GNTH!

The vocabulary is fair, and the game as a whole is not too bad. It isn't very atmospheric and is no way as good as The Hobbit or Snowball. Nevertheless,

Golden Baton is okay for the price.


