

This month you have the chance to read the results of the questionnaire which was sent out with OUM issue 23. If anyone who still has a form would still like to send in the questionnaire then please do, it is a very easy way of giving your opinions. The questionnaires are still available should you want one, just ask. The results take-up quiet a large part of this issue, 3 pages to be exact, but they had to be printed sooner or later. Thanks to all who returned their forms. We actually had about 35 returns, which isn't too bad considering that OUM only has a readership each month of 60 to 70. This isn't because readers dislikedOUM (the questionnaires proved that readers are happy) but most Oric owners don't know about OUM! 99% of readers who send for a sample copy follow-up with a subscription, but when 'Your Oric' magazine closed down they didn't mention OUM, which they'd been promising to do for quite a while, there are thousands (really) of Oric owners who would like to know about OUM, so if you know of one give them a nudge.

I have had a letter from a reader and I have racked my brain trying to figure out which section to put it in, without success - so I'll deal with it here. Mr P. Farnese from Essex has a problem that he hopes one of you lot can answer for him. He has an Oric-1 which is installed in a full-size keyboard complete with it's own power supply and printer (an Epson type) and it all works fine. However, when he changes the Oric-1 to an Atmos (by changing the ROM) the system crashes and hangs-up I Mr Farnese added that he uses the LPRINT command. He says that he has dis-assembled the ROM and found it correct, can anyone help ??? If you think that you may be able to help then please write to Mr Farnese, you will find his address in the 'For sale/wanted' section this issue. You can also, if you wish, write to me and I'll pass on any help offered.

There is a brand new 7 month feature heading your way, 'Let There Be Music' is a feature which will show you how to produce music at least equal to that heard in Damsel In Distress, Trickshot, etc. Along the way you will pick-up a couple of freebies in the shape of essential charts. See this feature if you are interested in micro-music, at an OUM near you as soon as space allows - it has already been written !

RESULTS

Here are the eagerly awaited results of the OUM questionnaire, I found the results just as interesting as you will. The inclusions were blunt, straight to-the-point, and they often went on to the other side of the sheet, you certainly had alot to say! 'What will our opinions do?' I hear you cry, your views certainly haven't fallen on deaf ears. Changes and new features have already been made and written, and possibly a few things will drop from OUM to make room for new ideas. The results....

Question 1 was 'where did you hear about OUM ?', the results were:

HGC: 19% A friend: 22% I.O.U.G.: 37% Micro-mart: 11%

New computer Express: 3% Popular Computing Weekly: 4% Micro Show: 4%

Question 2 asked you which Oric micros you owned, and the results were very interesting, only two people owned a Telestrat, 55% of you owned one Atmos, 15% owned 2 Atmos's, 5% owned 3 Atmos's, and there were a couple of scattered variations, inc. 2 Atmos + 1 Oric 1, 4 Oric 1 + 2 Atmos, no Oric, 4 Oric-1 and 5 Atmos, etc. but there was no-one owning just an Oric-1 :

Question 3 asked which other makes of micro you owned, and this question brought in some very rare computers. 20% of you didn't own a different make of micro, the larger percentages included:

CBM 64/128: 9% Spectrum: 11% Amstrad: 6% BBC/Electron: 14% Atari 8-bit: 11% Atari ST: 6% Sinclair QL: 6%

There were other computers, including the Apple, New Brain, CBM 500, ZX81 (1), and the Enterprise.

Question 4 asked where you bought your software from, there were no great surprises here with HGC generally winning outright, OPELCO, WE. Software, and Capri Marketing also made guest appearances.

Question 5 asked if you visited the OUM stand at the Alternative Micro Show, simple results:

Yes: 29% No: 71%

Question 6 asked which other magazines you bought, the results are far to scattered to print the full results here, but very popular magazines were New Computer Express, Micro Mart, Atari User and Popular Computing Weekly.

Question 7 asked if you could program in BASIC, M/C and Forth, and:

BASIC: 96% yes / 4% no FORTH: 32% yes / 68% no

MACHINE-CODE: 48% yes / 52% no

Question 8 was 'what is your favourite part of OUM ?' and among the usual and expected results mainly consisting of news and reviews/hints came the surge of fans of the 'RAMbling in the ROM' series, well over 30% of the votes went to the RAM/ROM series - all credit due to Jon Haworth for a wonderful new section !

Question 9 asked if you found anything in OUM boring, almost all of you were very satisfied or very polite because you said 'nothing', but some disliked book reviews, and the software charts.

Question ten asked how many hours - on average - you used the Oric for in one week. The lowest was $\frac{1}{2}$ an hour and the highest was 40 hours, it all worked out at an average of 9.4 hours a week, but the couple of very high results boosted the average alot, most of you said 5-10 hours.

Question 11 asked which issue of OUM was the best in your opinion, this was largely missed-out by alot of you (fair enough: it was a bit difficult to answer) but clearly the last few issues were the best, no. 18 and no.21 got the most votes.

Question 12 asked what hardware you owned, there were many varieties of bits and bobs, but 56% of readers own a disk-drive, 80% of you owned a printer (much high than expected 1) and 36% owned a joystick.

Question 13 said more or less the same as question 11, it asked which issue of OUM you had bought first. There were a couple buying OUM issue 1 when it first came out, and a few buying 2 - 4, but most joined at 15 +.

Question 14 was simple to answer, has OUM got better, worse, or neither since you first bought it. 0% of you said worse !!! 40% said it was the same and 60% said it was better.

Question 15 asked what types of OUM software you would want to buy, you were mainly interested in sports games, simulations and utilities.

Question 16 asked how many (if any) other people read your copy of OUM. 50% of you guard your copy closely and keep it foryourself, 42% let one other person read it and others included 2 and 4 other people reading it.

Then with question 17 you were asked what you would like to see appear in future issues of OUM, the suggestions were again wide and varied and all have been considered carefully, some asked for a disk-drive section (voila - you've got one now, we've had a new one for the past two issues), listings, machine-code features, and possibly a feature on the Orics special features inc. the FUNCT key, which is possible.

Question 18 asked which other Oric magazines you bought, before they all closed down, the results were on a 'yes/no' basis on five magazines:

Your Oric: 56% yes / 44% no
I.O.U.G.: 80% yes / 20% no
Oric Owner: 48% yes / 52% no
Oric User: 20% yes / 80% no
Tansoft Gazette: 8% yes / 92% no

Question 19 was the one which was of most use for me when considering how to change and improve OUM, I gave you 11 sections of OUM (eg. news) and asked you to circle 1 to 10 to express your interest in each, 1 was zero interest and 10 was maximum. The following results are averages:

News: 9.0
Hints & Tips: 8.5
Daves Data/Reviews: 7.3
Book reviews: 6.3
Top ten software charts: 4.2
Cover sheet: 5.9
RAMbling in the ROM: 8.5

Listings: 8.1

For sale / wanted: 8.0

Competitions: 5.2

Editorial: 7.4

Eventually, we got to the final question: no. 20 asked you what was your favourite Oric software title. The only surprise in this set of results was that utilities and educational packages easily, but then again, games simply have one use whereas utilities can be used for different purposes and you are much more likely to find use for a utility, say, two years after buying it, than a game. Out of the business/utility programs the most popular programs were Vortex (stunning word-processor), Composer (near perfect music utility), and Author (Tansofts decent WP). The most popular games mentioned were Zorgies Revenge (not surprising), Insect Insanity (the great but hard-to-find Tansoft game) and The Ultra.

Conclusions: I thought that I'd better add a conclusion so that you can see how your results have contributed to improving OUM. For a start, I can see that alot of you know 'machine-code', but quite a few of you added that you knew 'a little', so would a machine-code feature be welcomed? I could add a monthly section teaching readers how to learn the language, but I haven't the knowledge or time to do it so would any reader like to take up the challenge? Drop me a line if you're interested

I also noticed that RAMbling in the ROM and the news section were popular, and that reviews prove to be useful - the recently added sections obviously improve the magazine. Listings were very popular too, I've got loads of them still to print, so expect them whenever space allows. Hints & Tips were also highly rated, particularly the technical advise.

The only feature generally disliked was the 'software charts'. I admit that they can get somewhat repetitive at quiet times, but some readers did rate the charts as 6 or 7 out of 10, so would I be wrong in taking them away from the minority? Rapidly declining free-space means that the charts will most likely disapear, would readers wantsales figures or high-scores instead? Let me know please.

Another thing I noticed was that people wanted to aquire copies of the old magazines, in particular Oric Owner and Tansoft Gazette. It would be alot easier to get hold of these if someone could set up a magazine library, I would be willing to do this myself as a branch of OUM, but I would need to buy-up quite a few myself, or exchange them for free issues of OUM (extensions to your current sub.). I only ever had copies of 'TheOric' (the French classic magazine) but somebody kindly took them off my hands and promptly disapeared. If you have some to sell/swap please contact me soon.

Overall, expect a load-more of new ideas in OUM. games players will probably noticela decline (not too much though) in games-related material, although we've already dropped it by a great percentage. Graphics and music features have already been written for future inclusion, with some nice digitised pictures.

Thank-you once again to all who helped us in this feature, it wouldn't have been possible without suficient replies.

Things are still a little quiet in the news department, but gradually picking up, first up is the information on the OUM software front.

'Krystal Worlds' is still coming along slowly, the actual writing and designing of the adventure is now just about done, but it will take some time to enter it fully into the Oric, I've already spent two weeks de-buging many problems. Release date expected: November 3rd 1989

'Cricket' is almost ready for release, all that needs to be done now is to put together the instructions, enter soundtrack and do the amazing digitised loading screen (if everything goes to plan 1), release date expected: October 3rd 1989

Next comes news from CDO (Club Disc'Oric), the French disk & tape based magazine. I've seen the English version (of issue 2) and I have to say that it is very good, the translation is very good and it contains some interesting sections, such as graphics, screen-shots, and reviews. OUM software is reviewed in CDO, which is the only place where you will read them because as you know by now, we don't review our own software - just publicise them until you buy it !

CDO, by the way, is at: CDO, 58 Rue des Sculpteurs, 93240 STAINS, France. The CDO is also releasing new software to join the compilations already released, the new compilation will contain:

3D-Reversi: A HIRES version, superb according to the CDO Mizar: An arcade game, no details available as yet Tetris: A version of the game already on the ST, Amstrad, etc. Tetris on the other computers is highly original (it came from Russiant) puzzle game which has rocked the games market, I'll be interested in seeing how the Oric version compares to others

The price is very reasonable, 59F (tape) / 79F (disk)
There is another compilation on the way, 'Top secret' says the CDO so
I'll just say that it is for the more serious users.

Continuing with news, Jon Haworth has ventured into Foyles Bookshop and found a wonderful selection of Oric books, at decent prices. Do you want more book reviews? Foyles are at:

This month some mini-reviews, some easily available, some hard to get.

"Nowotnik Puzzle" - Tansoft

David Nowotnik was a guy who wrote many articles/programs for the computer mags in the early days of Oric. He released this comercially via Tansoft. Basically it is a puzzle very much like Rubik's cube, but with some varying levels of difficulty. If you like to spend hours solving puzzles, you'll appreciate this.

Rating: 7 out of 10

"One-key-BASIC"-F.G.C.

Written by Alan Whitaker of HGC this was released through Ken Smalldons FGC, this is a must for programmers. It allows you to re-define 26 keys by using FUNCT and SHIFT keys, how many times have you wished there was a short-cut to typing in commands such as GOSUB, CURMOV, DATA.etc.?

This is the answer to speed up your input.

Rating: 9 out of 10

Galaxions (Loriciels) - wasn't it Softek ? - ed.

A nice little 'Invaders' game, no way original but one of the better versions. Rating: 7 out of 10

"Psychiatric" - Sprites

A must for platform fans, this little gem utilises the colours + graphics of the Oric in the way only the French can. Plenty of options, you control your psycho through various stages as he is chased by wonderfully animated characters, when you are caught you frazzle just as though you were electricuted!

Rating: 9 out of 10

"French Linkword" and "German Linkword" - Tansoft

Both of these help you to learn the basics of a foreign lanuage, using the 'Grunnenberg' method, by way of word association. In no time at all you'll be putting together sentences, well put together along with a data cassette, audio cassette (for pronunciation) and a booklet/dictionary. Very handy if you're just starting out to learn a new language, also available in Spanish and Italian.

Rating: 9 out of 10
