

- \* OUM's firth software release, 'Grand Prix' is now available but for the moment it is only available on 3"disk. The reason for the lack of a tape version is because the game features multi-load, and so there is alot of tape winding forth & back. A tape version will most certainly be following very shortly (probably within two months at the most). #### 'Chess Madness'

100% machine-code, arcade/strategy. 20 levels, aparantly includes good graphics. Now available for both Atmos and Oric-1 48k.

Cost is 55 nkr. inc. P&P to Europe.

#### 'O.N. Pack'

Contains three games. First is 'The Way to KING Kung-Fu', 'Moon Buggy', and '3 x 3'. K.O.N. tell me that an extra game will follow, called 'Horse Race' which is for the Atmos only.

'Moon Buggy' is a re-release of the Norwegian game from 11985 by COMPUTER WORLD NORGE (who ?).

Cost is 45 nkr. inc. P&P to Europe.

Money payable to 'Arnt Erik Isaksen' by International money-order/Euro cheque and a 100 nkr. payment is fine for both of them together.

I've yet to see either of these releases in action, so my judgement is reserved.

#### RAMbling in the ROM - 11

#### Overlay

To recap, in the last two articles we've looked at the system, directory and descriptor sectors on a Sedoric formatted disc. It's worth stressing that all the figures are taken from a default-formatted disc, although of course Sedoric enables you to format a disc in a variety of ways.

To complete the illustrations (all of which are print-outs using Nibble, available etc...) Figure 5 is the first sector of the first program in the directory. So, in Fig. 3 (the directory sector) the first file was MENU.COM, whose descriptor is at Track 5, Sector #OA. This was shown in Fig. 4, from which we can see that it is a Basic program occupying three sectors from Track 5, Sector #OD - the first of which is Fig. 5. Simple, isn't it?!

The program itself, being in Basic, is coded in the usual way, as explained in most of the books written on the Oric. If it had been a machine code program, it would simply contain the successive bytes of the program. Similarly, a data file is stored as it is created in memory, byte after byte.

So, a brief look around a Sedoric disc. Slave and Games ('Shortsed') discs vary, of course, in that they use up much less of the early space on the disc. The directory tracks are identical, however, so you should easily find your way around them. Can I finally stress again the value of a good disc editor, and exhort you to acquire 'Nibble' if you don't have a copy already - you will never regret it!

But I use Oric DOS, I hear you cry. If so, get hold of Sedoric as soon as possible! (try H.G.C.). Otherwise, next time I'll take a look at the same sort of information for an Oric DOS disc.

Disc utilities

Two of the best disc utilities available are French, namely 'Nibble', a full-feature disc sector editor, and BD DISC, a collection of versatile utilities including tape-disc file transfer and disassembly/editing of each sector of the disc or of a particular file. Both were sold in France by 'Informatique & Nature', who have generously permitted Club Europe Oric to distribute them to members free of royalties. So, to members only (which includes anyone taking advantage of the current special offer of JEO No.4 for  $\pm 3.00$  and a 3" disc), they are available for  $\pm 3.99$  each - disc, post and packing included! Originally priced at  $\pm 19.99$  each, it must be the bargain of the year. Each comes with a short English instruction sheet, and both programs are in English. Needless to say, orders to me at 3, Madingley Road, Cambridge CB3 OEE.

#### Disc drives

The 3" disc drives we all use as nature and Oric intended are getting difficult to find and buy, and the only remaining source seems to be Steve Hopps at Opelco. Tell Allan Whitaker at H.G.C. if you are interested in an Opelco drive, so that he can impress on Steve the demand that exists. The French, who are now bereft of any disc drive producer for the Oric, are crying out for supplies.

However, what to do if you want a second drive? Always remember that, as with the Cumana interface for all drives, with the Microdisc you can of course use any size of disc drive as a slave. To illustrate, my son recently acquired a Siren  $3\frac{1}{2}$ " second drive for his Amstrad (Eeek!) CPC 6128. Believe it or not, the Amstrad (Eeek!) DOS will only recognise single-sided 3" format, and duly formats a lovely double-sided  $3\frac{1}{2}$ " drive with 178k of storage! A new operating system has to be loaded in to take advantage of the much larger storage capacity of the  $3\frac{1}{2}$ " drive.

It wasn't long, of course, before I plugged the new drive in in place of my Oric 3" slave drive. Boot up Sedoric on drive A, and let's get the most out of formatting drive B:

INIT B, 17, 56, D

Yep, 56 tracks of 17 sectors on <u>each</u> side of the disc, all accessible in one go. In other words each disc, without flipping it, holds almost 500k of data. That's ten major 48k programs on one disc.

If I sound enthusiastic, I am. The drive, neatly cased, only 1" high, and with power supply costs around  $\neq$  90.00 - not cheap, I grant you, but as a second drive with Sedoric, a joy to use.

Tail-ender (very)....

Which means all Club Europe Oric discs are now available on  $3\frac{1}{2}$ " disc as well! Which means  $\neq 1.00$  off all orders on  $3\frac{1}{2}$ " disc!! Now for  $5\frac{1}{4}$ "....



# LET THERE BE MUSIC 4

Welcome back to this feature, which has now been running for four months. Last month we had just seen the program we'll be working with, and gone through it line-by-line. I trust that you now have decided which piece of music you wish to enter into the Oric, and that you have the sheet-music with you (if not go and get it, I'll wait). You will need the previous parts to refer to if you haven't done it before.

What is the first note? Is there a note at the start? On line 200 of our program (which you should enter now) enter the word DATA which will now be followed by various values. First we'll deal with channel 1, is it a rest? If it is a rest then the first value will be 0 (zero) and of course follow it with a comma (,). As we need to fill the variable N1 in line 60 the next value can be anything you like (it doesn't matter what it is - as a 0 entered for 01, the first variable, will mean that a rest will be carried out, no matter what the N1 - note for channel 1 - is) but I generally choose another zero. So, if it is a rest the first two values will be 0,0. Next channel (chan. 2) is the same if it is also a rest, and the same for channel 3. Remember, two values are needed for every note.


What if it is not a rest? What is the octave of it? Use this diagram (not very good, I know, but it serves it's purpose) to help you. Remember, the C note is the lowest and first of any octave, right up to B of the same octave, then it flips back to C one octave higher. The diagram:



OCTAVE'S 1-5

You'll probably notice that octave 6 isn't shown, well you probably won't need it - but if you do you'll simply know that it is the C above octave 5. All the notes are the first note ('C') of each octave, the number of the octave is next to each C.

So enter the octave of the note into the DATA statement. Now to enter which note it is. Your music section will tell you the number representing each note, a 1 for C, 2 for C sharp, 3 for D, 4 for D sharp, etc. So if, for example, you want to enter the following notes:



You would enter 4,1,3,10,3,5. Let's cut it down to see what each digit means. The 4,1 means that it is a C in octave 4 (1 being the number for C, as shown on page 95 of the Atmos manual), 3,10 means an A in octave 3. (19 meaning A), and 3,5 is an E in octave 3. Simple eh?

As they only represent a length of 1, if each note has a length of four (see section 1 of this series for details of lengths) then you would use CTRL-A (the copy function) to enter those numbers twice.

We'll continue next month - where we'll explain fully with example bars.
