

INTERVIEW WITH VINCENT TALVAS (of C.E.O)

Soon after my return from holiday, I recieved a Phone call from Vincent Talvas, the President of 'Club Europe Oric'. Vincent had been staying with David Hall in Blackpool for the week and wanted to come down to Aylesbury for the last few days of his vacation. This seemed a 900d opportunity to get an interview with him and also for me to learn more about 'VORTEX'. Manuals are alright, but nothing is as 900d as Personal tuition. So if this does not print correctly, then blame my teacher.

Question 1 ----- What do you think of England?

Answer -- I think the English are very friendly & enthusiastic. About the country itself; it is a very nice one with splendid land - scapes. I like coming here and that is the reason why it is my seventh Journey to England, which removes me from my usual surroundings: it is a different way of life, a different behaviour....

Question 2

How old were you when you had your first computer and what was is?

Answer -- I was 13 years old when my father bought me a 48K Atmos. I remember that I saw it at a friend's house and fell in love with it. I was completely amazed by software like: 'Zorgon's Revenge', 'Ultra', and 'Triathalon'.

Question 3

Why did you decide to take over the runming of the Club Europe Oric?

Answer — I did not really decide to do it. When Stephane Sarlande decided in 1986 to stop managing C.D.D.I was the only Person to agree to continue; due to the time that is needed to be involved in running of an association. Do not think I was obliged to do it, but I thought that this club was the last chance for Oric to keep running.

Qustion 4

How many Oric owners would you estimate that are left
•in France now?

Answer — It is a very difficult question because we do not know how many Orics were sold in France. According to J.C. Talar (ex-manager of 'Oric'/'Eureka'), some 250,000 units were sold which included 8,000 Telestrats; whereas according to our data, there were only 200,000 units sold, which include 6,000 Telestrats. However, I think that the number of Opic users left is now less than 50,000; but this number could increase rapidly if we found quality software and Peripherals, as I am of the opinion that most of the ex-Oric users keep their computer in an attic.

Question 5

In Britain a new generation of Oric users has emerged. These are youngsters who have been handed down Orics from older family members or in some cases, People buy them because they are a cheap second-hand machine. Does this occur in France?

Answer -- Yes both of these oftions occur in France. However there are less people selling their Orics in France as they tend to be very sentimental & may use them as a secondary machine.

In Britain we are lacking in Programmers for new soft; ware. Do you have the same Problems in France?

Answer —— We have quite the same problem in France. Few Programmers for a few items of quality software. If it were not for Daniel Duffau and Thomas Gempp, we would be in a bad Position now. Quality software was written 2 or 3 years ago, but they did not see the light of day, as the software houses were not interested in releasing Oric titles. That is why one of our major aims, is to find these Programmers and their programs. For example, 'WILLY' was only on the market for about a month due to the bankruptcy of 'Oric International'. Happily we found Daniel Duffau, the author, and 3 months later, 'WILLY' was available once again at a very low price. Oric Int. originally sold the disc version for 150 france (#15) and we sell it in France for only 49 fr.(#5).

Question 7

What situation do you envisage the Oric groups being in two and five years hence.

Answer -- The outcome for 'Oric' will depend upon the involvement of the Oric users themselves. If we could succeed in finding very good value software and new Peripherals; Oric could survive a long time. It is possible too that the Oric will become fashionable in a few years because of it's advantages. i.e: good musical capabilities, the basic, the keyboard....

The Oric continues to be the best computer for beginners and People on a low budget. That is the reason why I think the opening up of the eastern european countries could be an opportunity. We plan to contact the original importer of the Oric into Yugoslavia where 6,000 units were sold, and we are presently in touch with Bulgaria.

Question 8

What did you learn by attending the Oric meeting, which was recently held in Aylesbury?

Answer -- The meeting in Aylesbury was very rich in lessons. I saw how the English Oric owners are "ORICMANIACS". Indeed , I think they are in general, more passionate than the French. The meeting also gave me ideas for organising our French meetings - it was an example to follow

Question 9

What do you do at your meetings in Paris?

Answer -- Our meetings in Paris are quite different. There are no stands, like there were in Aylesbury, but only an area dedicated to the Atmos and another one to the Telestrat. We do demos of Programs, we speak a lot about what it will be worth doing for the C.E.O, we Joke a lot too, because we are now friends. It lasts for about five hours and we do not have time to get bored.

Question 10

Do the People of France look upon the oric as **English or** French?

Hiswer — I personally look at the Oric as French now, because I am very patriotic. It is the same thing with Adidas. I think it is normal to feel a sense of Pride. However I think that most French People do not care of the nationality of the Oric. England constitutes a Great (and the most glorious) Part of the Oric history, as France of course, so Oric is seen as an Anglo-French company, with the French in majority, but it is not important. Now Oric is to one and all - A EUROFEAN CLUB

"GRIC MACHINE CODE"

In this article from Stan Ellison, we look at Machine Code. The second Part will be Printed in the next issue and deals with the Entering & Running of the Program. If you cannot wait till next month , just send an S.A.E to 'O.U. M' for the second sheet.

In order to write a Basic Program, you need only learn one discipline that of numbered instructions. The instructions are as close to everyday English as Possible & therefor fairly simple to master. You can teach youreslf Basic by trial and error without any knowledge of how the computer works.

In order to write in machine code you need to understand three separate sets of information. All 3 must be farly well understood before experimenting. They are: 1) How the CPU (Central Processing Unit) handles Data & Memory. 2) What the instructions are & how they are used. 3) How you get your program into the migro & running. The CPU, Data & Memory:

The most important part of the CPU is the ACCUMULATOR. Consider this the operating table of the CPU. Upon this operating table you place numbers. the These numbers can be altered tested or stored in memory. For those who don't know the memory consists of approx. 64000 numbered addresses, each containing a number. Memory address 48042 is the tor left hand side of your screen. If you type : 'POKE 48042,65' and Press 'RETURM', the letter 'A' will appear on the screen. To do this in M/Code you would load the Accumulator with the number 65. then you would store the contents of the accumulator at the address 48042. How to do this is the next step. Instructions, calls. stacks; aut surprisingly, vos i

In the 'Atmos' manual(appendix 3.page262) is a list of what it calls . These are the instructions you can use in M/Code. In the 'ORIC manual, see P. 159 onwards. Look down the list until you find 'LDA'. This 1 50 short for 'load the accumulator'. You may wish to load it with a number or the contents of a memory address. There are 8 or 9 oftions for LDA, depending on which manual you look at. These options are known as 'Addressin9 modes'. To put the letter 'A' on the screen we want the option that loads a particular number. This is the 'Immediate mode'. The code for this is #A9. SO this is our first instruction: 特用习 This must be followed by the number we wish to load in this case it's 65. #H9.65 now we have; The next task is to store this number in memory location 48042. The code for 'Store the contents of the accumulator' is 'STA'. My ORIC 1 manual manages to miss this one out all together, but the ATMOS manual gives 7 options. Here comes a tricky bit. The accumulator can only handle 8 bit numbers. That is numbers up to Numbers larger than that have to be handled in two Parts. The second Part is the number of times 256 can be subtracted from the original, and the first Part is What is left afterwards. 48042 is divisible by 256 on 187 times with 170 remaining. so the address

want we will be written as 170,187. With this type of address we must use the 'Absolute' addressing mode & the code is #8D. This code comes before the address so we get; #80.170.187 One final instuction is needed to bring the computer out of its machine code mode and back to Basic. This is 'RTS', or 'Return from subroutine'. The

#60 code for this is; Altogether the Program is: #A9,65

RAMBLING IN THE ROM - 18

This being scripted in the hols, I thought I'd repeat last year's literary effort (the final total of Oric books published in the U.K. was 40), and take a look at the magazines that have been published specifically for Oric users. To give a complete story, one ought to start with the forming of Tangerine back in late 1979. Their principal product was of course the 'Microtan' component system (a bit like a hi-fi set-up), and in due course the Tangerine User Group was set up to support the breed. T.U.G. produced its first magazine in November 1981, and continued each month right through to Issue 36 in October 1983. Meanwhile Tansoft in October 1981 produced Issue 1 of the Tansoft Gazette under the editorship of Paul Kaufman. It was a bi-monthly, and ran for seven issues through to October 1982. It was in Issue 6 for August/September 1982 that the first announcement of the Oric-1 appeared. The first hands-on test review appeared in the TUG magazine Issue 31, May 1983. The diagram below charts the lives of these two 'pre-Oric' magazines.



Now to the dedicated Oric magazines. The chart overleaf gives the outline details. First off the stocks, not surprisingly, was Oric Owner, in fact the Tansoft Gazette re-incarnated. The first issue, dated January 1983, was included with each Oric-1 sold. Bi-monthly issues then appeared regularly from June/July 1983 through to Issue 8 in June/July 1984. The plan then was to go monthly and onto the newsstands, but by then Oric's financial difficulties caused the scheme to be aborted. The ninth issue appeared for October/November 1984, and the tenth and final issue for December 1984/January 1985.

Over in France the Oric-1 sold like hot cakes, and the importers, A.S.N. soon produced their own magazine, Micr'Oric. Issue 1 was for June 1983, followed by quarterly issues through to Autumn 1984. Although the early issues were virtually a translation of Oric Owner, the mag rapidly attained its own identity, with some excellent French contributors, principally Fabrice Broche, coauthor of Sedoric Dos. Issues 7, 8 and 9 appeared in February, April and June, 1985, and the final Issue 10, issued in late 1985, was dated 'Winter 1986'. By then, of course, Oric had been bought by Eureka and A.S.N. had lost their distribution rights in France. To complete the early trio of mags, TUG changed the mags name to 'Oric Computing' and produced five glossy issues between November 1983 and June 1984.

The next magazine to apear was perhaps the greatest Oric magazine. It was French, and called 'Theoric'. The first issue was published in October 1984, and from the early days it was available on the newsstands in France. It ran without a break (except for the French habit of having a month off in August for the hols) for 37 issues, until December 1987, and provides us with perhaps the best collection of articles and programs ever

provided for the Oric user. In the end it tried to go subscription only, but the response was insufficient to justify continuing publication.



In England the demise of Oric Owner in December 1984 was swiftly followed by the establishment of Gary Ramsey's 'Independent Oric User Group'. The first newsletter appeared in April 1982, and was followed at intermittent intervals of two to three months right through until April 1989, a total of 23 issues. It was the mainstay for Oric users in the U.K. for over 4 years.

In June 1986 a new English magazine was launched by the Thomsom brothers. Called 'Your Oric', it was quite professionally produced, and ran bi-monthly until June 1987. A final issue was produced in December 1987.

Which brings us neatly on to O.U.M. itself. Launched by Robert Cook in September 1987, it has appeared monthly since then, and seems destined to continue indefinitely under Dave's enthusiastic hand. As can be seen from the chart above, we in the U.K. have never actually been without an English Oric magazine since that first issue of Oric Owner. And the French? They lost out during 1988 so far as the printed word goes, although Club Oric International (later Club DiscOric and now Club Europe Oric) was producing its excellent quarterly disc/tape magazine. The printed word returned with the CDO bulletin in February 1989. This ran to 8 issues ending in January 1990. Thereafter, of course, the JEOMAG was launched, the third issue being published in June 1990. It is the only printed magazine ever published in both English and French simultaneously.

So there we are. No less than 140 issues of Oric magazines since January 1983.....unless you know better, of course! As usual, I would welcome information on any publications I've missed. Until next month, when by now you will have realised there is something special to celebrate,

SOFTWARE DEMONSTRATED

Last month we had an introduction to the software that PETER BRAGG demonstrated at the 'Oric Meet'. Now for more information on the Programs.

TOOLKIT/UTILITIES

These 2 utilities are Probably the most useful i've written & are 10 yrs. old. Designed originally for the Tangerine Microtan; they have been used on the Oric, Apple 2e & BBC machines as well. Advantages - very fast & easy to use, mainly single key controls. Best of all they don't have the irritating habit Present in certain commercial software of deciding which parts of the computer, you are allowed to access. Great for checking out Reset Button operation.

a) CodeSet

----- Very simple to set any address & it will 90 there instantly and it will read & write anywhere accessable. Ideal for entering large amounts of code accurately & quickly.

b) CodeScan

in ASCII equivalents. It can be set to "HiLi9ht" required codes, for example, the RTS code 60h, which will then show up every routine in memory, or 00h which will show up all vacant space. It will scan slowly or quickly through memory and can be switched instantly to any page in memory. It will search out any instruction code anywhere in the Oric's memory in about 2 seconds flat & includes an 8 byte readout line. it can also write code, but the Codeset utility is better for this. One version works well as an Oric disk Editor.

WordProcessor

The memory like a roll of Paper. can Produce & edit multiple column text. Choice of formatted Prints or list form Prints, using Tandy/Oric Printer or Epson Compatable Dot matrix. Files can be Passed to & from the BBC & Archimedes versions. Much improved version on it's way. Professional C41 Process Simulator

For 24 years I worked with those responsible for Photography for official, state & royal occasions. Speed & high quality were Paramount when dealing with "Number 10" or the Palace. Anyone in the department standing idle likely to be scorched, soaked & covered in footPrints. Process control was an important part of the job. The management bought £2400 worth of software for our computer to handle process control for us, but to no avail. Enthusiasm for computers sank to an all time low. A quarter of the failed software involved esssential time consuming testing on the C41 colour negative process. I them wrote a very successful replacement for this using the Oric. A two hour procedure could be simulated in seconds with a few key Presses. Not only did it work, but we also found for the first time ever that the system could be fine tuned to our colour Printer's requirements. Interesting part is that it was written on both the BBC "B" & Oric and would run on both without any mods. Though not looking impressive & taking several months to write; it was nevertheless a real boon and eliminated a tedious task. A good illustration of what the Oric can do. BBC to ORIC Screen COMverter

Mode 4 display to Oric HIRES Display. BBC Mode 4 is used for the "FMX Mouse" software and "EV1" Optical Ram Camera.

Original idea was to Oric & BBC and use them to Produce an Optical Character Reader system., however the fact that the Archimedes display has a similar layout to Oric's and can run a scanner has raised some more interesting possibilities. Display screens were Passed from BBC to ORIC using the 6522VIA Project (P.83 of "Oric Advanced User Guide") linked to the BBC "User Port". It is also worth noting that the Oric can use the BBC Mouse or Trackerball if the 6522VIA Project is wired up as per the BBC "User Port".

"KRYSTAL WORLDS"

This Atmos only, Quilled' text adventure from the Pen of Robert Cook is a massive multi-Part 9ame which takes up every K of memory.
