

"ORIC MACHINE CODE"

We continue Stan Ellisons look at machine code. Last month we got as far as Preparing the Program and now we are ready to enter and run it.

Entering and Running

In order to run the Program we must Put this sequence of numbers into the memory. Where is not too important. 38000 upwards looks fairly safe. So:

```
10 HIMEM37399
20 FORM=38000TO38005
30 READ:POKEM,D:NEXTM
40 DATA#A9,65,#SD,102,188,#60
```

This will enter the Program into the memory. A good habit to get into with machine code routines is to save it before running. When it is saved use the CALL command to run it. Type 'CALL 38000' and Press RETURN, or add a line to the Program:

```
50 CALL 38000
```

You can try altering the number 65 to change what appears on the screen. Numbers 16 to 23 produce background colours. You can change their position by altering the numbers 170,187. They can change up to 224,191 before leaving the screen part of memory.

This might seem a long winded alternative to POKE 48042,65 but try this:

```
FDRA=48040TO49120:POKER,32:NEXTR:PING
```

This takes quite a few seconds to complete. Compare it with:

```
CLS:PING
```

This is the machine code version. Much faster. This increase in speed is what makes all the mind bashing worthwhile. This is of course, only the sketchiest of introductions to what is a very complicated subject. There is far more to the CPU than just an accumulator. There are X and Y registers, a status register, a stack, a program counter and more.

This example has used only three instructions. There are 56 different instructions and over 150 ways of giving them. You need a book on the subject to take you through the complexities of addressing modes, OP codes, flags, tests etc.

I recommend Rodney Zaks 'PROGRAMMING THE 6502'. It is very thorough and methodical in its approach and it contains an excellent reference section that you will come back to time after time.

One other item you may wish to use is an assembler. Assembly language is a way of simplifying the writing and entering of machine programs. Personally I have never used one. I do most of my stuff by hand on paper. First a very careful flow chart, then what amounts to a memory map of the program showing mnemonics, data and addresses. I then convert the mnemonics into code, convert the addresses into 8 bit numbers and then enter that into the machine. I enter the instructions in hex and the data and addresses in decimal and this is usually enough for me to find my way around the program when checking or correcting. I've noticed that people who use an assembler tend to fall about with hysterical laughter when I describe my system, but it works well enough for me.

What I would really like to know is what would you use ROR or ROL for?

INTERVIEW WITH VINCENT TALVAS - PT.2

NOW TO THE CONCLUDING PART OF MY RECENT INTERVIEW WITH VINCENT. A BIG THANK YOU TO HIM FOR TAKING THE TIME TO ANSWER THE QUESTIONS AND SOME BRITISH LAMB IS ON IT'S WAY TO HIM.

QUESTION 11

IN YOUR OPINION, WHAT WERE THE MAIN REASONS FOR THE COLLAPSE OF THE ORIC IN THE FRENCH MARKET?

ANSWER

Several reasons can be given and I think they are all partly true. The first is that the French company was not professional enough: a great number of machines broke down within a month of purchase; a lot of software and peripherals were announced and most of them did not see the light of day. They sold the 'Telestrat' before having finished the Basic...it wasn't very serious, was it not? The second reason was that they did not take notice of the market: selling programs like 'Chenille infernale' for £15 and the 'Telestrat' for £399, when an Amstrad 6128 at the same price included a colour monitor. It was pure suicide; even if we know that Telestrat was devoted to the professionals. The third reason stems from that fact. The actual sales were way below the expected sales. At the beginning, ORIC/EUREKA had 100 licensed shops in France. Two years later and there were less than 20. Oric, however had a lot of trump cards: they were the official supplier of monitors to the schools and the Telestrat began entering the schools. The Telestrat product could have been excellent but all was slap-dash. What a pity!

QUESTION 12

WHAT IS THE ALL-TIME FAVOURITE SOFTWARE OF THE FRENCH, AND HOW MANY COPIES DID IT SELL?

ANSWER

I think I represent the whole French community when I say that the programs we like most are: Zorgon's Revenge, L'aigle D'or, Le Secret du Tombeau, Chess III (I,J,K), Roland Garros, Cobra Pinball, Mission Delta and Xenon I. Titles are numerous, but it seems to me that IJK and Loriciels are the best software houses for the Oric. I'm afraid I can't tell how many copies of each were sold.

QUESTION 13

HOW MANY COPIES OF 'WILLY' AND 'TETRIS' HAVE BEEN SOLD IN FRANCE?

ANSWER

I cannot answer exactly. Between 20 and 30 copies of 'Willy' were sold. The sales of 'Tetris' have so far been disappointing. Although the prices were very low, most of the Oric owners do not purchase our software in great quantities. French buyers tend to wait for the special offers.

Lots of new Programs added to Jon's Public Domain library recently. Jon informs me that he has now sent out about 250 copies. Some work involved there Jon - Well done. Latest additions to the library include: THE BUSINESS - a game taken by David Goodrum from the on-line Games area on CYCLONE BB's. Also donated by David is a RANDOS Program which utilises the Random Access Filing System. Best of luck to David at Bristol Polytechnic.

RAMBLING IN THE ROM - 19Poking in the library

I'll leave all the celebrations to Dave and dive straight into a smashing new batch of programs I've added to the P.D. Library. Many thanks to those who have taken the message to heart and sent in programs, the results speak for themselves. Keep them coming!

There are no less than nine new programs:

CPD-38 - CANNON 8k 40p

With quite simple graphics, this is an enjoyable test of your ability to aim and fire a cannon accurately. The program incorporates accurate ballistics calculations.

CPD-39 - SCRIVENER 13k 50p

What can I say? Each new word processor seems an improvement on the last, and that's certainly true of Scrivener. You have a choice of 40 or 60 column screen, and when you print out you are asked for the printer column width - the document is then reformatted in memory, including word-wrap, to produce a neat document. All the usual features are there, plus an on-screen help page listing all the available commands. These are accessed within a document using the FUNCT key (CTRL on Oric-1). What is more, you can call up your own in-built Basic program from the document screen, for example to perform repetitive calculations. If I sound enthusiastic, I am!

CPD-40 - HYPERBALL 11k 50p

A Breakout clone with a difference. First of all, it's extremely fast. Secondly you can control not only the bat, but also the flight of the ball. And thirdly, there's an obnoxious character in the middle of the screen whom you can knock out with a couple of well aimed wallops. All in all, an excellent program.

CPD-41 - BUSINESS 12k 50p

The first of three programs from the pen of Dave Goodrum. This is a simulation of the running of a computer manufacturing company, with weekly decisions required as to staffing, stock levels and production quotas. It's not easy to succeed, and the general presentation is very well done. Well worth seeing!

CPD-42 - CONVERTER 2k 10p

A quickie from Dave, which converts almost anything into anything else! Not only metric to imperial and vice versa, but cups to pints (?) and many others. Again very nicely presented.

CPD-43 - SOFTINDEX 10k 50p

Dave's tour de force, a fully implemented program to keep a record of your software. Multiple search criteria, record addition and amendment, and screen and printer display options. This could readily be altered to suit any subject-matter (send your own versions in!). It is inevitably DISC ONLY, running under RANDOS. Don't let that put you off, it is fully boot-compatible with all Oric DOS's.

CPD-44 - TAROT 32k 50p

Written by Judy Simms, this specialist program assists you in making Tarot card readings. You need your own cards, but the program does the rest, guiding you through the reading and giving detailed predictions at the end. Fascinating!

CPD-45 - HIND 18k 18k

A highly individual program. You play the role of Sir Francis Drake during the 16th century. Text only, the program is historically very detailed and accurate, presenting you with decisions to be made, and comparing your choice with what actually happened. You start with 99%, and if you get everything wrong you find yourself on 0% before the end of the story! Very enjoyable.

CPD-46 - PATIENCE 6k 30p

The classic card game, nicely implemented by Judy Simms. I've spent hours playing this!

As usual, orders to me at 3, Madingley Road, Cambridge CB3 OEE, with £2.50 for a 3" disc, £1.50 for 3½", and 50p for a cassette, plus 50p post & packing.

So there we are, nine programmes of real quality in one month. Who said there was no new software? The library is proving a real success - I've now sent out over 230 copies of programs, so keep the orders and the new material flowing in.

'SEDORIC'

With many disc users now exploring the SEDORIC DOS; I thought it time to pass on a few tips which might help you to find your way around it. When I first try Sedoric, I was puzzled by it. It was only by asking questions and some trial and error, that I've got as far as I have with it. Though, I am the first to admit that I have a lot to learn. Perhaps some of my jottings may prove time saving to others.

One of the features of Sedoric is the use of the 'FUNCt' key. You can program this for yourself in much the same way as 'ONE KEY BASIC' allowed you to on cassette. On the other hand, you might like to utilise the set-up that is already on your master disc.

Set out below is a brief summary of what certain keys do when held down with the 'FUNCt' key.

FUNCt P = PEEK
FUNCt W = PATTERN

THE LISTING SET OUT BELOW WILL WORK FOR SEDORIC USERS ON DISC AND I SEE NO REASON WHY IT WILL NOT WORK ON OTHER DOS's.

LINE 140 IS JUST ANY TITLE THAT YOU MIGHT WANT TO CALL THE DISC. THOUGH THE PROGRAM IS IN BASIC, IT IS BEST TO PRETEND ON SEDORIC THAT IT IS A 'COM' FILE AS YOU CAN THEN LOAD WITH A STRAIGHTFORWARD ! AND DO NOT NEED TO INCLUDE THE EXTENSION. THEREFORE SAVE THE FILE WITH e.g. !SAVE"HELLO.COM", AUTO.

ONE OF THE MESSAGES DISPLAYED WHEN FORMATTING A SEDORIC DISC IS 'INIT STATEMENT (Y/N)?'. IN THIS INSTANCE AT THAT POINT IN THE FORMAT, YOU WOULD ENTER - !HELLO.

DURING OTHER TIMES THAT YOU FORMAT A DISC, YOU NEED JUST PRESS 'RETURN' AT THE 'INIT' MESSAGE OR ALTERNATELY TYPE - !DIR , SO THAT THE DIRECTORY IS DISPLAYED.

NOW FOR THAT LISTING, WHICH OF COURSE YOU COULD EASILY ADAPT AND PUT AT THE FRONT OF ONE OF YOUR C60 COMPILATIONS ON CASSETTE.

Thanks to some great effort on David Wilkin's part; we are now able to offer our very own repair service for your sick ORIC 1 and ATMOS. We can also modify your machine to have hard and soft reset button. We wanted to make it a fast service. This we hope to achieve.

The services offered are as follows:

OPTION 1: Send your faulty P.C.B. which we will take in part exchange for a working board. ---- This is the quickie service and will cost between £15 and £20.

OPTION 2: If you do not want to take the machine apart yourself; just send the whole machine and we will again replace the P.C.B. ---- This is again a quickie service and will cost between £16 and £20.

OPTION 3: You may of course particularly want to keep your own P.C.B. if you have done any mods to it. In this instance the service will obviously be somewhat slower and the price will be £21, which like all options includes postage back to you.

OPTION 4: You may require a keyboard repaired or may require a keyboard that functions correctly. In this instance you will receive a quote which will obviously be a lot cheaper than that for a full repair.

TRANSLATED FROM FRENCH TO ENGLISH BY JON HAWORTH.

Robinson Crusoe is marooned on a desert island. Clearly he must escape to freedom - but how? Whichever way he turns, he sees a different landscape and maybe a different hazard. There are things to help and things to hinder him; but eventually he realises which is which and starts making slow progress through his island prison. He soon realises that he must make a careful map - a map slightly different in layout than those he has made in previous adventures. Armed with a weapon (which one?) he overcomes the dangers and discovers the final clue needed to reach the last location and freedom.

I found this graphic adventure quite enjoyable with some interesting technical features. The scenes are of limited detail and there are no really cryptic clues to solve. However, I must admit to a bit of cheating to allow myself to complete the adventure and put this review together. In fact, solving the problem in that way can be quite intriguing.

There are about 20 verbs and nouns in the game's vocabulary, and about 30 different locations. However, since a different view is given when facing each way, there is a larger number of different scenes.

As ORIC adventures go, this probably falls into the 'simpler-to-solve' category, but knowing it can be done should set you a challenge.
